A BILL

To require the Department of State's Bureau of Counterterrorism to develop and maintain written counterterrorism strategies for countries and regions where there is a significant terrorist threat or ongoing United States counterterrorism engagement.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Responsive Counterter-
- 5 rorism Policy Act".

1 SEC. 2. COUNTERTERRORISM STRATEGIES.

2	(a) Establishment.—
3	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of State shall
4	direct the Department of State's Bureau of Counter-
5	terrorism to develop and maintain a written counter-
6	terrorism (CT) strategy for each country or region
7	where there is a significant terrorist threat or ongo-
8	ing United States CT engagement in order to en-
9	hance the effectiveness, coordination, and account-
10	ability of United States CT policy.
11	(2) Purpose.—Each strategy required by this
12	subsection is intended to be distinct from the De-
13	partment's annual Country Reports on Terrorism
14	and is to serve as a forward-looking, operational
15	planning document that is specific to the Bureau of
16	Counterterrorism.
17	(b) Matters to Be Included.—
18	(1) In general.—Each strategy required by
19	subsection (a) shall—
20	(A) identify the specific threats posed, ar-
21	ticulate clear objectives, outline coordinated ac-
22	tions with interagency partners and inter-
23	national partners, and describe metrics for as-
24	sessing progress and success.
25	(B) specifically describe how coordination
26	with such partners will be carried out, including

1	clearly defined roles, responsibilities, and mech-
2	anisms for collaboration;
3	(C) take into account local political, eco-
4	nomic, and social dynamics and should align
5	with broader United States foreign policy goals;
6	and
7	(D) ensure that the Bureau of Counterter-
8	rorism shall serve as the lead entity with re-
9	spect to such strategies.
10	(2) Interagency and international part-
11	NERS.—For the purposes of paragraph $(1)(A)$ —
12	(A) interagency partners shall include all
13	relevant bureaus, offices, and components of
14	United States Government departments and
15	agencies that contribute to CT efforts in any
16	capacity; and
17	(B) international partners shall include all
18	foreign government entities and local actors
19	that are actively engaged in, and demonstrably
20	committed to, CT efforts within their respective
21	countries or regions.
22	(3) References.—Any references to other
23	United States Government department or agency or
24	international partner is intended to articulate the
25	Bureau of Counterterrorism's understanding of on-

1	going efforts, coordination mechanisms, and areas of
2	engagement, and not to imply shared authorship or
3	responsibility for any strategic documents.
4	(4) UPDATES.—Each strategy required by sub-
5	section (a) shall be reviewed and updated on an an-
6	nual basis, or more frequently if significant changes
7	in threat dynamics or policy priorities occur. Each
8	such update should incorporate lessons learned and
9	reflect changes in operational context or strategic
10	priorities.
11	(c) Congressional Briefings.—
12	(1) Initial Briefing.—Not later than 90 days
13	after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Bu-
14	reau of Counterterrorism shall brief Congress on the
15	countries and regions for which it plans to develop
16	the strategies required by subsection (a), including
17	the criteria used to prioritize such strategies.
18	(2) Annual Briefings.—The Bureau of
19	Counterterrorism shall brief Congress annually on
20	the development, implementation, and updates to the
21	strategies required by subsection (a), including how
22	the strategies inform programmatic funding and dip-
23	lomatic engagement.
